STBU Council—A Primer

Every month, usually the third Thursday, a group of people gather at a large meeting of the STBU (Secondary Teacher Bargaining Unit) called "Council", which is comprised of the Executive, Branch Presidents, additional delegates (depending on school size) as well as other interested members.

By coming to Council, you have an opportunity to hear first-hand from the President of our Bargaining Unit, Doug Jolliffe, our Chief Negotiator and other members of the Executive. The reports will inform you about the major issues as well as successes within our bargaining unit, the province and labour in general. You will also hear about the activities of our various committees (which you are always welcome to join) such as the Status of Women, Political Action and Gay-Straight



Alliance. In addition, the Provincial Executive makes a report about province-wide issues. Often, it is the Provincial President, Paul Elliot, and Treasurer, Earl Burt who attend the meetings to give the report and answer questions from members. The reports are followed by a Q & A, which also includes other items of concern to branches and individual teachers. Here, issues can be aired and remedies are often suggested either by the Executive or other teachers who have experienced similar issues in their schools.

"Delegate" attendees can also move motions on actions and policies for the bargaining unit to undertake, they can speak to these motions as well as vote on them. This is where the use of coloured cards may be important. With the help of the instructions in your "Council package" and some tutelage from a long-standing delegate, you will be at the microphone with the appropriate card in no time. In order to make Council meetings more accessible, food is provided as well as a travel and dependent care subsidy, if required.
